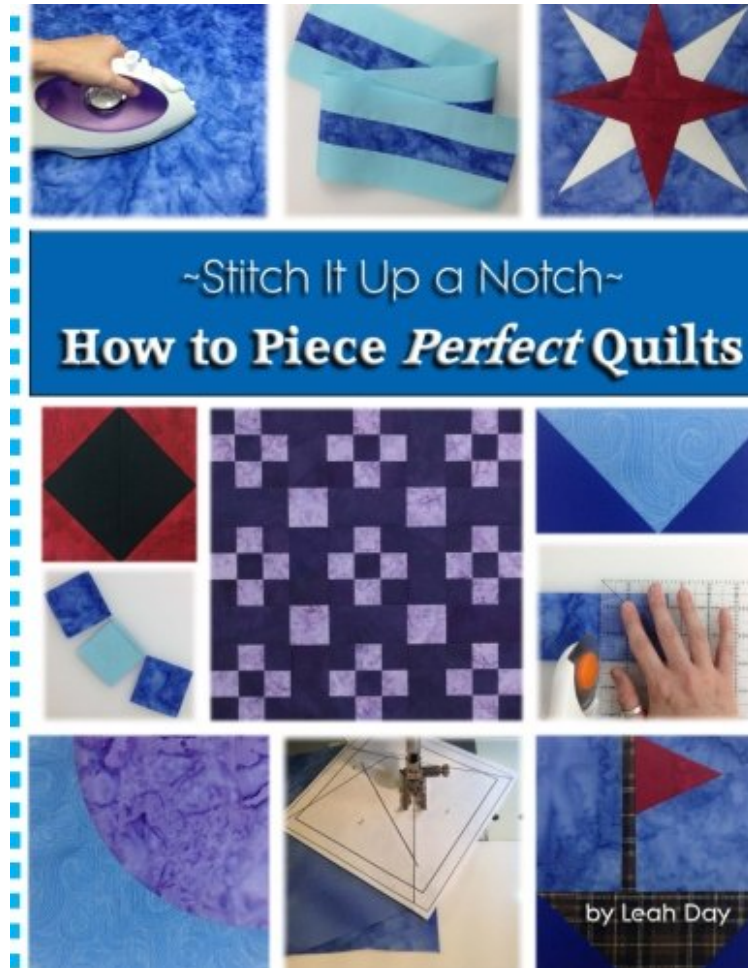

Although I don't agree with everything the author has to say, it is very helpful to understand why she suggests the things she does.
